Another incredibly busy week of learning, friendship building and showing how we can all be 'Ready, Respectful and Safe'. Our assembly today focused on another one of our British Values - tolerance. We spoke about children and their families all being different. We looked at our appearance, family arrangements and likes and dislikes. I challenged the children to look around to find someone else who looked exactly like them - if they could they could have 100 stickers! I found myself having to look at the differences between freckles and hair strands for some of our twins!! The learning point was that we must respect and show care to all people regardless of what we perceive as different. I tried to trick the children into voting for which family dynamics were the best, they all quickly responded, all of them. Well done, children.

hope this weekend brings some milder weather. I know de-icing the car is starting to take it toll on all of us! Have a great weekend. Mr O'Shea:)



This week in early years, we have...

Our book this week was *The Perfect Fit* where we have been talking about things we are good at, things we do that are kind and about different 2D shapes. We have been on a shape hunt and created pictures using circles, triangles and squares. This week in the sensory area we have been developing our hand eye coordination by scooping and pouring pasta, and we have enjoyed investigating ice in our outdoor area – brrr chilly!

Reception have been looking at all things winter this week, reading a story about winter animals and a warm cosy fire.

In maths we have focused on the different ways we can make the number 5, playing games and using different resources, then moving onto capacity as well as weight. In phonics we have learnt the new sounds '**nk**' and '**ng**' - we made rings, sang some songs, used different pink resources, looked at trunks and lots more!

We were lucky with our winter theme this week for the weather to turn so cold. We loved putting water out at night with different objects in to find they had frozen the next day. We discussed how water turns into ice when cold enough as well as the clothing we need to wear when we go out into the cold. Alongside our winter theme, we enjoyed playing with small world animals in the fake snow, wrote our own winter stories and made snowmen out of white playdough.





















This week in KS1 we have...

This week in Year 1 the children have been continuing their learning about all things cold. We have been learning Polar Bear facts from our non-fiction Polar Bear fact book this week and did some great group work to help us remember our facts. We then wrote our own fact books and did a fantastic job at using phonics, spellings and writing in full sentences. In Music we used a variety of instruments to create our own improvised music and performed them to the rest of the class. In PE and Geography our theme is 'weather'. We have looked at how the weather makes us feel and moved accordingly in our dance lesson and also how it affects the clothes we wear, how we travel and the activities we do. In Art we celebrated Chinese New Year in preparation for the weekend by learning to draw Chinese dragons. Remember that this week we learnt our first Trick Box trick 'Mirror, Mirror' where we are trying to say nice things about ourselves, even when looking in a mirror. Try to practise this at home together. Do not forget to take a look at our question of the week in the window. Hopefully the children can teach you a thing or two!









Year 2 have been learning all about the rainforest! We have recorded notes using commas for lists and used this information to write a non-chronological report about rainforests full of relevant facts. We have also researched using secondary sources in science to explain how an animal is suited to live in its environment through their adaptations. We have learnt about division this week by grouping and sharing objects equally. The children have really enjoyed the practical element of this. We have recapped our knowledge of the names of the 7 continents and the names of the 5 oceans in geography using the 'Oceans' song we learnt last week in music and labelling the oceans on a map. We loved our first trick from Trick Box this week 'Mirror, Mirror' where we practised positive self-talk.

Reading stars & PANTS

NSPCC Pantosaurus

Along with many schools across the country, at Crawley Ridge Infant School we use the NSPCC Pantosaurus rule to help to teach children about keeping themselves safe. With the help of the friendly Pantosaurus dinosaur, adults, both at school and at home, can teach children about how to stay safe from abuse.

At a level appropriate for their own age, all children learn about how the parts of their bodies which are covered by their underwear are private parts and are not for other people to see or touch and how important it is to talk to someone about anything which upsets or worries them.

New this term! When a child has read at home at least three times in the week and this is documented by an adult at home (reading record book signed three times) they will receive a golden star sticker. These will be stuck to the back of reading records. There is a competition to see which children at school will collect the most!! This will hopefully encourage children to ask and plead to read at home, which is the key to reading for pleasure.









Reading - oxford owl

Reading is the most important aspect of any school's curriculum. Reading inspires children, improves vocabulary and speaking, helps with writing and is a genuine life skill that opens the doors for your child's future.

All children will have a book issued to them. This will be in their bookbag. These books will be at your child's reading level. Books should be readable and not too challenging – children should be able to read them successfully. This improves the chances of children developing a love and passion for books. If they are too challenging, research shows reading then becomes a chore and is not as enjoyable for young readers. Children must also be able to comprehend/understand the book they have read.

Children in Reception will start their phonics lessons next week. For now, they will be issued with a wordless book. Children learn how to hold and use a book; turning the pages and talking about the images they see. Parents can ask questions such as:

- What can you see in the picture?
- What number is on the page?
- What do you think will happen next?
- What is your favourite picture why?
- What part of the story would you change why?

In addition to children's books in book bags, our school also has an online eLibrary. This allows teachers to allocate groups of books to children. These can be read at home on a laptop, iPad, tablet or mobile device. At school, we will monitor which children are using the eLibrary and prizes will be awarded to those participating consistently.

I cannot encourage and emphasise enough how important it is to read at home with and to your child. We will be running phonics workshops for parents this term to help empower you all to continue supporting your children at home.
