Believe in yourself.


For the past two weeks our 'trick' has been 'mirror mirror'. Being able to give yourself some positive praise.

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## This week in early years, we have...

This week we've been learning about Chinese New Year. We have written our wishes to hang on our wishing tree, been scooping and pouring with rice and practised using chopsticks to pick up our playdough noodles. Our book of the week has been *The Great Race* and we have had fun re-enacting the story, jumping our animals over the fabric river!

Outside, we have been loving exploring our new sandpit and mud area, aren't we lucky! Next week, we would like all children to have a pair of wellies at school please, if they haven't already. Also, a set of waterproof trousers or an all-in-one will help to protect the children's clothes whilst we're busy having fun  $\odot$ 









This week we have been celebrating Chinese New Year. Our story of the week has been *I Love Chinese New Year* which follows a family and the traditions they have around the New Year. Alongside this, our PSHE focused on the story *The Magic Paintbrush* – we talked about all the things we would create if we had our very own magic paintbrush.

In phonics, we have focused on two new sounds this week – **ai** and **ee**. We have been busy painting rainbows, making paper chains, creating snails, doing **ee** word hunts outside and drawing bees. Our maths this week has looked at the numbers 6 and 7 – exploring how we write and make these numbers. We even wrote these numbers in Mandarin (along our Chinese New Year theme) outside with black paint! We loved listening to the story *Six Dinner Sid* and make our own dinners for Sid. We have explored China as a country, finding it on the map and in atlases as well as looking at its flag. We tried some noodles, painted blossom trees, made lanterns and cleaned the home corner!


















### This week in KS1 we have...

YEAR1

Well, what a busy week it has been for us all. The children have done so well with all the visitors we have had in school this week. They have confidently shared their knowledge, learning and work with them and they have been excited to demonstrate what they know. Our focus for this week was moving on to the hot climate of Kenya, Africa, with the story *Handa's Surprise*. The children loved trying to think of their own adjectives to describe the fruit and loved getting involved with having real fruit to look at and touch to help them. They had a real good go at including adjectives in their retelling of the story on Tuesday. In maths we have moved on to addition within 20, recapping all the skills we learnt with addition to 10 and applying them to 20. We then learnt how our number bonds to 10 can help with number bonds to 20. In Science we have continued looking at materials and learnt the words opaque, translucent and transparent to describe them. In Computing we are looking at Online Safety and we talked about sharing images online this week and which ones can and can't be shared.











YEAR2

The children have worked incredibly hard this week learning about a rainforest animal for their non-chronological report. They have researched using secondary sources and taken notes to help them write factually. We have learnt about subordinate conjunctions to add more detail to our clauses. We have also learnt more about rainforest animals in science where we thought of our own questions about rainforest animals, we searched for patterns in our answers and displayed what we found in different ways. We have continued our learning of dividing by a one-digit number. The children applied this to solving word problems with one or more steps. In geography we identified human and physical features then designed our own worlds containing only human or physical geographical features – they were very different! We have started to learn about notation in music this week. We learnt about the musical value of a crotchet and quavers as we sung and clapped "Rockstars of the Reef".

## Reading stars & PANTS

### **NSPCC Pantosaurus**

Along with many schools across the country, at Crawley Ridge Infant School we use the NSPCC Pantosaurus rule to help to teach children about keeping themselves safe. With the help of the friendly Pantosaurus dinosaur, adults, both at school and at home, can teach children about how to stay safe from abuse.

At a level appropriate for their own age, all children learn about how the parts of their bodies which are covered by their underwear are private parts and are not for other people to see or touch and how important it is to talk to someone about anything which upsets or worries them.

## Reading - oxford owl

Reading is the most important aspect of any school's curriculum. Reading inspires children, improves vocabulary and speaking, helps with writing and is a genuine life skill that opens the doors for your child's future.

All children will have a book issued to them. This will be in their bookbag. These books will be at your child's reading level. Books should be readable and not too challenging – children should be able to read them successfully. This improves the chances of children developing a love and passion for books. If they are too challenging, research shows reading then becomes a chore and is not as enjoyable for young readers. Children must also be able to comprehend/understand the book they have read.

Children in Reception will start their phonics lessons next week. For now, they will be issued with a wordless book. Children learn how to hold and use a book; turning the pages and talking about the images they see. Parents can ask questions such as:

- What can you see in the picture?
- What number is on the page?
- What do you think will happen next?
- What is your favourite picture why?
- What part of the story would you change why?

In addition to children's books in book bags, our school also has an online eLibrary. This allows teachers to allocate groups of books to children. These can be read at home on a laptop, iPad, tablet or mobile device. At school, we will monitor which children are using the eLibrary and prizes will be awarded to those participating consistently.

I cannot encourage and emphasise enough how important it is to read at home with and to your child. We will be running phonics workshops for parents this term to help empower you all to continue supporting your children at home.
