

This week in early years, we have...

This week our book has been **What The Ladybird Heard**. We ended up speaking about animals so much, that it lead to many children wanting to be vets. So we've been enjoying a vet role play outside, allowing us to practice taking turns and learning about the different vet equipment.

We have also started Phonics this week – yay! We have been using our drum stick to tap on different objects and using our listening ears to hear the different sounds.

Today we have celebrated World Book Day! We have loved the children's costumes and have enjoyed decorating our wooden spoons. We even went to our very first school assembly and showed the big children our costumes. The children did amazingly well 🕲



Elmer has been our story of the week so we have taken the opportunity to discuss our differences and how it's great for us all to be different. We have loved listening to and reading a wide variety of Elmer stories over the week. We created a class collage of Elmer from our individual squares, ordered numbered Elmers to 20, created our own Elmer puppets and the scene to act out the story and painted a patchwork Elmer with many different colours.

Our sounds of the week have been **oo** (b**oo**k) and **ar** (st**ar**). We have looked in books for the oo sound, filled in footballs and made star wands. We have been checking the children's knowledge of harder to read and spell words and sounds learnt so far.

Our maths focus this week has been the numbers **9** and **10**, learning how to write them, where they are placed on a number line and how we can make up these numbers using resources (4+5 or 3+3+3 etc.). We have been practising the formation of all our numbers, please keep practising these at home! Diamond class had their first forest school session, which they absolutely loved. Ruby class can't wait for their turn next Tuesday. Please note, the classes will be alternating forest school each week - taking part every fortnight. However, please ensure your child is dressed for forest school **every** Tuesday, making it easier to remember and in case there is opportunity for children to take part in extra sessions!

This week in KS1 we have...

In year 1 this week we have used the story **The Way Back Home by Oliver Jeffers** in English. The children listened to the story and watched a short video based on it too to help them retell what had happened. We have been having a big push on their handwriting this week, making sure their letters sit correctly on the lines. In maths we have started looking at numbers up to **50**. The children have explored how many tens and ones are in the numbers and practised lots of counting to and from 50. We started an exciting new adventure in Computing this week where we have begun exploring a programmable toy called 'Cubetto'. The children had great fun finding out what it could and couldn't do and are looking forward to using algorithms in the next few weeks to move him around the classroom. In History the children continued their learning in Victorian homes and found out that many homes didn't have a bathroom and had to use a toilet in the garden!! We talked about how lucky we are to have all these luxuries in our homes today.



This week we have been busy creating templates and prototypes of our Brazilian carnival masks. The children tested their designs by cutting them out and checking they could see safely out of them. During maths we have continued our learning about fractions, exploring unit and non-unit fractions. We would like to thank our very first mystery reader for coming in to Sapphire to surprise the children. The children loved the poems – especially the Homework Machine! The children were excited to write a retelling of the story **"The Way Back Home"** after being inspired by the animation by Oliver Jeffers.



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Reading - Oxford Owl

Reading is the most important aspect of any school's curriculum. Reading inspires children, improves vocabulary and speaking, helps with writing and is a genuine life skill that opens the doors for your child's future.

All children will have a book issued to them. This will be in their bookbag. These books will be at your child's reading level. Books should be readable and not too challenging – children should be able to read them successfully. This improves the chances of children developing a love and passion for books. If they are too challenging, research shows reading then becomes a chore and is not as enjoyable for young readers. Children must also be able to comprehend/understand the book they have read.

Children in Reception will start their phonics lessons next week. For now, they will be issued with a wordless book. Children learn how to hold and use a book; turning the pages and talking about the images they see. Parents can ask questions such as:

- What can you see in the picture?
- What number is on the page?

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- What do you think will happen next?
- What is your favourite picture why?
- What part of the story would you change why?

In addition to children's books in book bags, our school also has an online eLibrary. This allows teachers to allocate groups of books to children. These can be read at home on a laptop, iPad, tablet or mobile device. At school, we will monitor which children are using the eLibrary and prizes will be awarded to those participating consistently.

I cannot encourage and emphasise enough how important it is to read at home with and to your child. We will be running phonics workshops for parents this term to help empower you all to continue supporting your children at home.
