

This week in early years, we have...



This week we have loved Science Week!

We have taken part in experiments: like Skittles in water making a rainbow, pepper in water which moved away from a soapy finger, just like germs do when we wash our hands! We have investigated objects that float and sink, and tested how fast cars travel down ramps covered in different materials.

We have learnt all about our senses and completed a 'smelling' investigation where we tested if we could tell what an object was from its smell. We easily recognised coffee and orange, but mint was tricky to identify. We also played with spaghetti on our sensory table, using our sense of touch. 'It was so sticky and stuck to my hands!' said Margot.









We have immersed ourselves in our story of the week - *Jack and the Beanstalk*. Our week started by finding a strange green stalk that reached the ceiling of our classrooms on Monday morning, with some magical beans hidden underneath. We have all had the opportunity to create our own leaves to put on the stalk and explore different versions of the story, including Jack and the Jellybean Stalk - where we were able to pick out similarities and differences. We loved making our own magical castles which could be at the top of our beanstalk and learnt about what castles are, their key features and what they were used for in the past. We also wrote wanted posters to help the giant find Jack. We talked this week about how plants grow and their lifecycles - we even planted beans to make our own beanstalks!

In phonics, we have been recapping the sound oo (spoon) and learning the new sounds or and ow (prowl). We have listened to and made our own pictures for the story 'Room on the broom', created popcorn cones filled with popcorn, coloured and written brown cows and dressed clowns.

Our focus for Maths has been around number bonds to 10 and we have explored this in different ways - with numicon, counters, cubes and tens frames.




















This week in KS1 we have...

This week Year 1 have been working hard in maths to consolidate their understanding of place value to 50; recapping partitioning into tens and ones, recall of one more and one less and estimating on a number line. They have been learning about length and height, using the correct vocabulary and using non-standard units of measure. During English, the children have been retelling the story of *Three Billy Goats Gruff*.

During History, the children have been learning about the famous person, Alexander Graham Bell, who invented the early telephone and have been sorting old and new telephones. Within our school participation of British Science Week, the theme of Connections has been explored with a day of rotation activities throughout Year 1 and 2. During our lesson, animals and insects were sorted into groups dependent on the connections between them; the link between climate change and the effect on humans and animals has been explored. Finally, the children have been looking at the needs of humans and animals to survive by growing their own cress seeds. The children have been completing final touches to their moving vehicle models by adding axles, wheels and lights.









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We are loving creating our carnival masks - they look fab!!

In Maths we are learning about measuring in centimetres and metres using mathematical equipment such as rulers and metre sticks. The children also enjoyed going outside to measure real objects in the playground including the pirate ship, slide and benches.

Science week has been amazing, we loved visiting all the different classrooms to make connections between science and other subjects. We have written super instructions including adverbs - we hope brave adventurers catch our dragons soon!

Reading - oxford owl

Reading is the most important aspect of any school's curriculum. Reading inspires children, improves vocabulary and speaking, helps with writing and is a genuine life skill that opens the doors for your child's future.

All children will have a book issued to them. This will be in their bookbag. These books will be at your child's reading level. Books should be readable and not too challenging – children should be able to read them successfully. This improves the chances of children developing a love and passion for books. If they are too challenging, research shows reading then becomes a chore and is not as enjoyable for young readers. Children must also be able to comprehend/understand the book they have read.

Children in Reception will start their phonics lessons next week. For now, they will be issued with a wordless book. Children learn how to hold and use a book; turning the pages and talking about the images they see. Parents can ask questions such as:

- What can you see in the picture?
- What number is on the page?
- What do you think will happen next?
- What is your favourite picture why?
- What part of the story would you change why?

In addition to children's books in book bags, our school also has an online eLibrary. This allows teachers to allocate groups of books to children. These can be read at home on a laptop, iPad, tablet or mobile device. At school, we will monitor which children are using the eLibrary and prizes will be awarded to those participating consistently.

I cannot encourage and emphasise enough how important it is to read at home with and to your child. We will be running phonics workshops for parents this term to help empower you all to continue supporting your children at home.
