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This week in early years, we have...

This week we have been loving our book '**Wow Said The Owl**'. We have been exploring everything colour! For our maths learning, we have been sorting objects by colour and learning about repeating patterns. Maybe you could make a repeating pattern at home using blocks, toy animals or socks!

We have been singing songs about colour and enjoying spotting colours in our environment. We have even been learning sign language for the song I Can Sing a Rainbow!

We also enjoyed working on our fine motor skills, making colourful bracelets by threading beads onto pipe cleaners. Aren't they lovely?



We have continued with our beanstalk theme using our book of the week, Jasper's Beanstalk. We have looked at the stages of growing a bean and spoken about how you have to be patient when waiting for a plant to grow - this is something Jasper in the story did not have! We learnt a song to go with our story of the week and have written sentences about what Jasper was doing in the story, we also practiced ordering and singing about days of the week.

We have learnt the new sounds oi and ear this week - finding coins in the soil, writing captions for Oi Frog! and covered objects in foil. We also pinned the beard on Santa, decorated different beards and made string telephones with paper cups, trying to hear each other with our ears.

In our maths lessons and provision this week we have been looking at 3D shapes, finding these around the classroom and thinking about their properties. We then moved on to patterns, focussing on AB and more complex ABC and AAB patterns. This would be brilliant for the children to practice at home with everyday objects!

On Wednesday, we were lucky enough to have a visit from our School Councillors, who came to tell us what being a School Councillor is all about. Next week we will be voting for our very own class representatives!



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This week in KS1 we have...

Another week has flown by and we have packed so much in! We started the week with our new History topic about Highwaymen, using the story, **The Highway Rat**. We learnt that the Jolly Farmer roundabout is named after the famous Highwayman, William Davies, who lived in Bagshot. The children were fascinated to learn how different the transport was all those years ago. We made detailed wanted posters for the Highway Rat, using so many adjectives.

In Science we have been reviewing the seasons. How wonderful that the weather is finally showing glimpses of sunshine to support our learning about Spring. The children have continued to learn about place value within 50. We are far more confident at counting in 10s now. We have also started learning about mass by comparing weights of objects. The children thoroughly enjoyed getting the scales out and measuring items around the classrooms. We finished our week with a wonderful visit to Milestones Museum where we were so proud of the children. Their behaviour was exemplary and they were all a credit to our school.



This week Year 2 have been recapping addition and subtraction of 2-digit numbers. They have impressed us with how much they could remember! The children have used an effective method to prove their answers. In grammar we have learnt more about complex sentences using subordination. Following on from our Dragon wanted posters and instructions in English, we wrote non-chronological reports about dragons. In science we have been learning about inventors and their inventions. The children were really inspired.

In Geography we explored what life is like in Brazil ready to create a non-chronological report about Brazil next week! Earlier in the week, we had a fantastic time carrying out our wheel and walk survey. Thank you so much to our parent helpers who supported in depth discussion about road features in our local area.

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Reading - Oxford Owl

Reading is the most important aspect of any school's curriculum. Reading inspires children, improves vocabulary and speaking, helps with writing and is a genuine life skill that opens the doors for your child's future.

All children will have a book issued to them. This will be in their bookbag. These books will be at your child's reading level. Books should be readable and not too challenging – children should be able to read them successfully. This improves the chances of children developing a love and passion for books. If they are too challenging, research shows reading then becomes a chore and is not as enjoyable for young readers. Children must also be able to comprehend/understand the book they have read.

Children in Reception will start their phonics lessons next week. For now, they will be issued with a wordless book. Children learn how to hold and use a book; turning the pages and talking about the images they see. Parents can ask questions such as:

- What can you see in the picture?
- What number is on the page?

- What do you think will happen next?
- What is your favourite picture why?
- What part of the story would you change why?

In addition to children's books in book bags, our school also has an online eLibrary. This allows teachers to allocate groups of books to children. These can be read at home on a laptop, iPad, tablet or mobile device. At school, we will monitor which children are using the eLibrary and prizes will be awarded to those participating consistently.

I cannot encourage and emphasise enough how important it is to read at home with and to your child. We will be running phonics workshops for parents this term to help empower you all to continue supporting your children at home.
