This week in early years, we have...

We have started this half term learning all about nature, beginning with the book *A Seed in Need* and thinking about what plants need to grow. We have enjoyed planting some flowers and we will also be planting various seeds over the next couple of weeks. We have loved using playdough to create our own plants and flowers, using different cutters and tools to make different creations.

Outside, our new book nook area has been very popular, with the children sharing stories and retelling tales using puppets. We have also enjoyed water play, building pipes for water to travel down whilst improving our hand-eye coordination.










It has been lovely to have the children back and hear all about their Easter holidays! Our book of the week has been *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* by Eric Carle. We have enjoyed learning about how caterpillars grow into butterflies and the stages they go through. We are expecting to receive some very special visitors soon and we will be watching them as they turn from caterpillars into butterflies!

We have enjoyed lots of caterpillar and butterfly themed activities including making cocoons, paint printing and paper chains. In our PSHE this week we have discussed healthy eating and made a fruit salad.

Our phonics is now focussed around recapping the sounds we have learnt and using them within our spellings and sentences. We have learnt the new harder to read and spell words - what and when. We have practiced writing these and making them into sentences and questions.

In maths we have been focussing on numbers up to 20, seeing the pattern, ordering and writing them.



















This week in KS1 we have...

What a lovely start to the Summer term we have had this week. The children enjoyed writing and sharing their holiday news in English. It looks like they were kept so busy and are definitely ready for some new learning. In Science this week the children planted their own sunflower seeds which they will nurture and watch grow. Once they are getting big they will bring them home to plant outside to see how big they get. In maths we have been learning how to count in 2s and 5s. We looked at the patterns of the numbers to help us remember what comes next. In Geography we have started to learn all about the UK. We explored England and the capital city of London this week. I wonder what the children can tell you about England? For RE the children have now begun finding out about the religion of Judaism. They were very excited to see their special book, the Torah and some other artefacts used by Jews. They are looking forward to seeing what else they do and how similar or different it is to Christianity.









YEAR?

We have all been incredibly excited to return to school after the Easter holidays! We were especially excited to see all of the beautiful plants and flowers around our school that have blossomed over the break. In English we have read a variety of poems about spring and even wrote our own spring themed poems! In maths we have been practising reading and showing o'clock, half past, quarter to and quarter past times on an analogue clock. You can help us practise this at home by asking us to tell you the time at different points throughout the day. In Science we have started an investigation to find out what plants need to grow healthily. We suggested what we thought plants might need to grow then devised a plan for how we might test this. We're looking forward to seeing how our sunflower seeds grow over the coming weeks and finding out if our predictions were correct. In Geography we have been learning about map symbols and features. Next week we will be looking at sketch maps.

Reading is the most important aspect of any school's curriculum. Reading inspires children, improves vocabulary and speaking, helps with writing and is a genuine life skill that opens the doors for your child's future

All children will have a book issued to them. This will be in their bookbag. These books will be at your child's reading level. Books should be readable and not too challenging - children should be able to read them successfully. This improves the chances of children developing a love and passion for books. If they are too challenging, research shows reading then becomes a chore and is not as enjoyable for young readers. Children must also be able to comprehend/understand the book they have read.

Children learn how to hold and use a book; turning the pages and talking about the images they see. Parents can ask questions such as:

- What can you see in the picture?
- What number is on the page?
- What do you think will happen next?
- What is your favourite picture why?
- What part of the story would you change why?

In addition to children's books in book bags, our school also has an online eLibrary. This allows teachers to allocate groups of books to children. These can be read at home on a laptop, iPad, tablet or mobile device. At school, we will monitor which children are using the eLibrary and prizes will be awarded to those participating consistently.

I cannot encourage and emphasise enough how important it is to read at home with and to your child. We will be running phonics workshops for parents this term to help empower you all to continue supporting your children at home.
